- I. Call to Order: The meeting was called to order by the Curriculum Chair, Dr. Kimberley H. Stiemke, at 3:36 p.m.

- VI. Approval of the Minutes: It was moved by Megan Reeves and seconded by Alli Stanojkovic to approve the meeting minutes for the meeting of February 13, 2024, with minor corrections. The motion passed unanimously.
- VII. Public Comments (2-minute max): No public comments.
- VIII. Report of the Curriculum Chair: The Chair shared that she has made efforts since September to recruit a faculty member to the DCCC committee since two NOCE faculty members should be represented. However, this has not been accomplished and as a result, neither she nor Dr. Karen Bautista will be able to attend the upcoming DCCC meeting. This leaves no representative available to present the curriculum and so the review of the current curriculum items at DCCC will be postponed for another month.

She also shared that she was tasked with exploring whether Curricunet can send notifications to co-contributors. However, it is currently not a feature that Curricunet can provide.

Additionally, she has been exploring a locking mechanism to prevent changes to courses after the committee's review. The ongoing challenge is that edits continue to be made after the committee

has reviewed what they believe is the final version of a course/program.

The Chair distributed a methodology sheet for reference as it will be discussed later in the meeting.

Grading and Canvas Pilot- Dr. Bautista announced that the North Orange County Community College District has hired a consulting company to develop a system in Canvas in which it will allow faculty at NOCE, Cypress, and Fullerton to use the Canvas grade book to assign grades, which will then be integrated into Banner.

However, she noticed a range of grades being assigned at NOCE and is unsure if there is consistency across departments. The Board policy on grades was reviewed, and Dr. Bautista requested that each department discuss their grade policy at their April departmental meetings and report the grades faculty are using. This information will be brought back to the committee for review.
